Hard to believe we are almost halfway through this shortened Term 2. Students and staff have been working on the end of reporting cycle. Teachers have observed student attitude towards their learning including the effort shown when working both in class and their preparation for the following classes. This important information, as well as a number of assessment tasks, framed the outcome of the reports for each student.

I encourage parents and carers to sit down with your child and look through these reports. Conversations around their achievements and any areas where improvement can be made help form a stronger connection around learning. Reports and feedback on the assessments, can be found on COMPASS.

Curriculum Planning Day

Tuesday 9th May we had the first of our whole staff professional Learning Days. The day was a chance for us to review some of our Literacy and Numeracy practices. The main focus was centred around us developing a common language for our differentiation approach. Staff planned on how they are looking to embed the following language when looking at enabling and extension activities:

- **Building Confidence (Enabling prompts activities)**
- **Feeling Good (at level)**
- **Up for a Challenge (extension activities)**

Moving forward this work will underpin our teaching and learning approach to ensure we are catering for a range of abilities.

Currently our students are completing the annual attitudes to school survey. This is a great opportunity for our students to give their insight to how they see the school is going. Once we get the results, we will sit down with focus groups and see what issues may be able to be addressed.

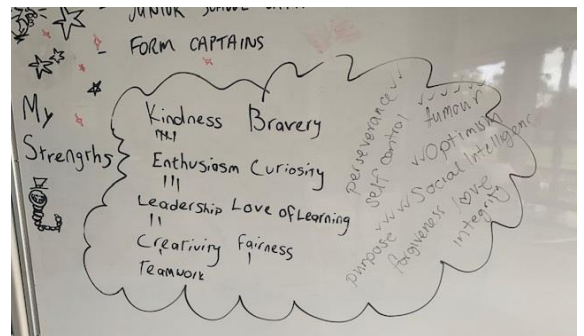

SEX, CONSENT AND
STAYING SAFE



Dr Justin Coulson, one of Australia's leading parenting experts and father to six daughters, has put together a presentation designed specifically for parents of high school students.

How are we supposed to talk to our children – our teenagers – about consent, respect, alcohol and other drugs, staying safe, and all of the risks they face? Between us not knowing what to say, or when or how to say it, and our kids not willing to hear it, we're in a tough spot. But we have to have the conversations. We must. So where do we start?

In this session, you'll hear:

- What teenagers are getting up to in terms of alcohol, drugs, pornography, and sex.
- Why they think they know everything (and why it's so hard to teach them anything)
